FROM THE RECTOR:

Dear All,

Little did I realise that 12 months on from seeing an advert in the Church Times during the first week of January, I would be sitting writing to you all in the first week of January 2021 as the Rector of Curdworth, Middleton and Wishaw having gone through one of the most momentous years in history.

Who would have thought that in early January last year, when coronavirus was briefly mentioned in a news item and we were all looking forward to what 2020 held for us all, we would be where we are today. Even after the discernment days on the 20/21st February none of us had any inkling what the next 4 weeks would bring and yet here we are 12 months later.

As I am writing this, I am looking out of the office window and I get a real sense that in many respects, that, while so much has changed or been changed, there is a comfort knowing that God is at work in our community and our world and that many things haven't changed. The grass is beginning to grow (note to self – sort mower out), the snowdrops are appearing, the birds are starting to look for nesting sites and the days, albeit slowly, are starting to draw out. It is the rhythm of the seasons, a rhythm that sometimes only a rural parish such as ours understands. This Sunday is not only dedicated to the Baptism of Christ but is also Plough Sunday, when the ploughs and seeds were blessed for the coming season (a tradition we will uphold this year). The prayers and blessings for this can be found in the Church of England's "Times and Seasons;" under the agricultural year. Farmers and those who work the land understand fully the importance of the correct time to sow and reap and when to wait. As we begin this year, we continue to find ourselves in a season of waiting. The whole of the last 12 months seems to have been about waiting for things: - a new Rector, an announcement, to move, to get back to our buildings, for something to change, for Christmas, for a hug and yet we continue to wait. Waiting by its very nature is difficult, we are impatient and in the modern world even more so, but waiting is very biblical, from Psalm 37 "Wait for the LORD, and keep to his way, and he will exalt you to inherit the land".

As we wait, I would encourage you to be resolute over the coming weeks. It is going to be difficult, but the scientist in me is very optimistic as we have come so far in such a short space of time. I can only draw one conclusion and that is that what we are seeing is God at work to help humanity. I know some would question that, but the number of people who keep saying "I am praying for a vaccine" surely says something about where people are ultimately putting their trust. I have been blown away by what has been achieved so let us just hold on to the hope we have, and I am sure we will soon be able to meet people again in person. So yes, there is a sense of loss and waiting at the moment but there is also hope and expectation that things are going to get better. That, I believe, is where God is speaking directly to us at this time. That is God at work in this world. God has not abandoned creation, shown by sending Jesus Christ to redeem this world, and I believe we are beginning to see what God wants to do in our Parish at this time by building community and giving us a vision to look out into the world to see what we as a church can do for others.

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INTRODUCING: Two new courses available for all in the Aston and Sutton Coldfield Deanery – us!

The Way of Discipleship, starting with Module 1, Being with God. This Diocesan developed 7 session course looks at how we grow in our relationship of love with God each day. This module explores what is a disciple, why it's important to actively engage in following Jesus, and how we develop this relationship in our life and worship. More details can be found about the course on the Diocesan website.

<u>Women's Theology Group</u>: Associated with the Women's Theology Network this group is for women, looking at women in the Bible and discovering what their lives teach us about God both then and now. These first sessions are looking at some of the women in Jesus story including Tamar, Rahab, Bathsheba, Ruth, The Virgin Mary and Elizabeth. These are passages that rarely make it to the lectionary and are revealing and interesting to study together.

Each group will run *fortnightly on alternate weeks*; there are *two* sessions for each group. *Tuesday 10.00 - 11.30am and Wednesday 7.30 - 9.00pm*

The groups will start with **Way of Discipleship Tuesday 12th January 2021 and Wednesday 13th January 2021,** and the following week will be **The Women's Theology Study starting Tuesday 19th January 2021 and Wednesday 20th January 2021.**

Collect and Readings for Sunday 10th January 2021

The Collect

Eternal Father, who at the baptism of Jesus revealed him to be your Son, anointing him with the Holy Spirit: grant to us, who are born again by water and the Spirit, that we may be faithful to our calling as your adopted children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

is from Genesis chapter 1

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters.

They answered, 'Into John's baptism.' ⁴Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus.' ⁵On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. ⁶When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied – ⁷altogether there were about twelve of them.

⁴John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.'

⁹In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. ¹¹And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'
